## THE DOBBS' AND SNEDENS' FERRY IN THE

 EIGHTEENTH CENTURYThe beginnings of the ferry are vague. We know that Jan Dobbs came to Westchester in 1698 or 1700 and owned property on the shore of the river; and we know that he was a nephew of William Merritt who lived in Cheer Hall at that time. It is likely that he had a boat and crossed the river now and then to see his uncle William; but the first real ferryman, in 1729, was his son William Dobbs.

This seems reasonable when one thinks of the situation on both sides of the river at that time. The Albany Post Road had just been built in Westchester. 0n this side the Ludlows had built the Big House at the top of the hill, which meant that there would have been a passable road up the hill, and perhaps on to closter, by which people could have gone to and from the ferry.

Less than twenty years later, Robert Sneden, recently arrived here, began the family connection with the ferry which was to last until 1803. The former Cheer Hall is shown on the Verplanck Map of 1745 as "Sneedings House the fferry." Robert died around the middle of the century, but his wife, Mollie Sneden, survived until 1810. She was a colorful character. Many stories are told of her exploits: she ran the ferry, shot a hundred pigeons with one shot, hid a Tory spy, had a tavern in the former Cheer Hall, and died at the age of a hundred-and-one.

The first boat was a perriauger, or dugout. Soon there were two boats, one large enough to carry horses and wagons. One of the most spectacular equipages to cross the ferry was Martha Washington's coach in December, 1775, with five or six passengers, a coachman and postillion, and a mounted escort. All roads were bad at that time, but the one down the hill at Snedens must have been almost the worst. (See pg. 2)

## GIRL SCOUTS

At the beginning of the Revolution, most of the Snedens were Tory sympathizers. Robert even became a pilot for the British war-ships. The local patriotic committee issued a proclamation forbidding all the Snedens but John to "keep ferry." Mollie and her unmarried son Dennis moved to New York, and most of the others went to Nova Scotia. John stayed here and undoubtedly ferried many of the patriots who crossed and recrossed the river when conditions permitted. He also served at times as pilot on American war-ships.
