TRUCKS AGAIN

The law is clear; no vehicle over 5 tons (unless making a local delivery) can enter Oak Tree Road between 9W and Rte. 340; there is a 10 ton limit on Rte. 340 and lower Oak Tree Rd. If the sight of a truck going east or west along Oak Tree Road makes your blood pressure rise, try the following (as some Palisades residents have, successfully): 1) follow the truck to its destination, call the police and ask that they be given a ticket for using Oak Tree as a short route to their destination, 2) contact the company directly (a staff member spoke to Mr. Johnson of Academic Press about their trucks using this route, he brought the matter before the executives of the company who in turn instructed their drivers to obey the law, 3) write letters to companies in the area (Bookbinders, Rockleigh Industrial Park, etc.). Ask them to comply with the law also.

SCHOOL REORGANIZATION

On Wednesday evening, Feb. 18, some 250 school district parents crowded the South Orangetown Jr. High School in Blauvelt to respond to various plans and studies to reorganize the use of the districts 5 remaining school buildings due to declining enrollment. Some of the plans called for the closing of 1 or 2 elementary schools leaving the district with a high school, a Jr. high school and either 1 or 2 elementary schools. If 2 elementary schools were closed the plans called for a departure from the traditional K-5 grade arrangement to all K-3 in one school (Schaeffer Elementary in Tappan) and all 4-5 grades in a separate wing of the Jr. High School in Blauvelt.

The special public hearing was called for by School Board Members and Supt. Richard Olcott who listened while the Tappan Zee Elementary PTA objected to the closing of their school "which serves as a focus for young children in the communities of Palisades, Piermont, Sparkill, Grandview and parts of Orangeburg and would leave this side of the district without a single

school." The PTA and parents from the Tappan Zee Elementary area also joined with parents from other parts of the school district and the Teachers Association in further objecting to the change from the K-5 grade arrangement. The Cottage Lane Elementary School PTA (whose school in Blauvelt is The Cottage Lane Elementary slated to close on many of the proposed plans) objected to a grouping change of young children also, stating they wished their children to be kept together and their Principal and programs to remain intact regardless of which building they were located in. The Schaeffer Elementary School PTA stated they could not endorse any plan which did not give them information regarding the fate of their existing educational programs. (cont. Pg. 2)
