PALISADES IN THE ELECTION

Palisades voters maintained traditions in the 1981 election: higher turnout than average, substantial decline from the presidential-year turnout (nearly 30%), and Democratic majorities at odds with the overall results in Orangetown. A total of 463 votes were cast: 250 in District 12 (Palisades School) and 213 in District 50 (American Legion), including 11 and 2 absentee.

In all the contested elections but one (Town Justice), Democratic candidates carried Palisades. In all the same contests but one (Sheriff), the same candidates lost in Orangetown. Countywide, Democrats won all three contests -- two Family Court judges and Sheriff.

The Right to Life line continued to generate problems and paradoxes. Scrocco, the only Democrat with RTL endorsement, gained 18 votes on that line in Palisades but ran 73 to 125 votes behind other Democrats on the Democratic line. Feenick, who had also sought RTL backing but lost it to Scrocco (reportedly by the flip of a coin), ran 48 to 74 votes ahead of other candidates on the Republican line and held even on the Conservative line. Town-wide, the results were similar, though far less dramatic. Scrocco received 1,244 RTL votes and ran 1,276 to 1,977 votes behind his running mates for Town office on the Democratic line. Feenick ran ahead of Colello by 422 on the Republican line and 102 on the Conservative; ahead of McLiverty by 1,144 and 186; ahead of Groll by 1,535 and 258. While other factors undoubtedly affected voters' choices between the two Town Justice candidates, the results indi-cate that running on the Right to Life line in Orangetown probably costs a major-party candidate a small net loss in total votes.

Both propositions carried Palisades as well as Orangetown and Rockland County. The \$500 million bond issue for prison construction was favored in Palisades by 166 to 128 opposed; the Job Development Authority amendment by 172 to 114.

RESTAURANT REVIEW

I had been waiting with great expectation for Raoul's of Prince Street fame in New York City to open their Nyack restaurant. They have, and I was not disappointed. My thanks to Serge and Guy Raoul, both residents of Nyack, for bringing their fine French restaurant to our neighborhood.

For birthdays, anniversaries, holidays or a splurge de la cuisine, go to Raoul's. It may be expensive, but it is worh it. Forget the drive to the city, eat here and save on tolls, parking, extra babysitting costs.

We set out for Raoul's, a happy party of six ready for good food. As soon as you enter the restaurant, you are caught up in a feeling of festivity. The old Village Hall has been splendidly renovated, leaving the tin ceilings intact. There is a lovely mural of the Hudson Valley as well as plush banquettes. Large sprays of fresh flowers throughout create a charming background for contented diners. The kitchen is open, spacious, and I want one just like it for Christmas.

The food is essentially nouvelle cuisine, and everything is à la carte. Appetizers include escargots in cream and cognac sauce, Blue-point oysters in mignonette sauce and stewed wild mushrooms à la creme. One can also order the Nyack salad: endive, watercress, Boston lettuce, sliced chicken breasts and foie gras. The portion is generous enough to serve as a main course. Prices are \$6.00 to \$10.00.

The selection of entrées is varied enough to please any palate. The fillet of salmon was cooked to perfection, succulent, served with a creamed watercress sauce. While some people think raspberry vinegar is over-rated, I happen to like it. When served with a fricasse of chicken, I found it light and pleasantly sweet. The rest of our party ordered the roast pheasant, done à point and glazed with a truffle sauce that was nice and syrupy. Entrées range from \$12.00 to \$20.00.

The desserts are limited presently to pastries, ice cream and sherbert. Fresh fruit will be offered in season, and other selections may be added.

The house wine, Beauvignot, is quite adequate at \$8.00 per bottle.

They do plan to change the menu from time to time.

On Friday and Saturday evenings, the Cabaret upstairs offers shows at 10 pm and midnight. There is a \$5.00 cover charge. We wish Serge and Guy Raoul the very best.
