MILDRED RIPPEY: "IN CELEBRATION OF WOMEN"

Each year a day is set aside to honor Rockland County women whose achievements have enriched the lives of their families, friends, colleagues and communities. This year on April 24, at their 3rd annual "In Celebration of Women" ceremony, the Rockland County Women's Network and Rockland Community College, chose Mildred Post Rippey to receive their Personal Achievement award. Mildred was selected not only for her deep sense of personal fulfillment, and initiative, but also because of the inspiration she has shown to others. Her continual pursuit of knowledge and involvement in life will be acknowledged in June when she receives an Associate degree in the Arts from Rockland Community College.

In the past two years, twenty-five women have received awards in the Arts, Business and Industry, Communications, Education, Personal Achievement, Religion and Public and Community Service. In 1980, Fay Ellison, former Pastor of the Palisades Presbyterian Church was honored for her work in Religion.

HORACE GREGORY, POET, CRITIC, ESSAYIST AND BIOGRAPHER

Horace Gregory, 83, died this spring in Shelburne Falls, Mass. only a few months after his wife, Marya Zaturenska. Until recently, Horace and Marya Gregory lived on Closter Road in Palisades and were special friends of the Palisades Library.

Mr. Gregory, a member of the National Academy-Institute of Arts and Letters, received the Bollingen Prize in 1965, regarded as the highest honor in American poetry. His wife, who wrote under the name Marya Zaturenska won the Pulitzer Prize for neetry in 1938

Prize for poetry in 1938.
When Mr. Gregory's collected essays,
"Spirit of Time and Place," appeared in
1973, Edgar Johnson, the Dickens biographer, said that "Mr. Gregory is not one
of those scholar-critics who write only
for other scholar-critics. He is a scholar without pedantry, who concentrates not
on exhibitionism but illumination."

A MONUMENT FOR MOLLIE

ΙN MEMORY 0F MARY SNEDEN WHO DEPARTED THIS LIFE JANUARY 31 AD 1810 AGED 101 YEARS 18 DAYS

LORD OF OUR DAYS, WHOSE HAND HATH SET NEW TIME UPON OUR SCORE THEE MAY WE PRAISE FOR ALL OUR TIME WHEN TIME SHALL BE NO MORE


This epitaph appeared on the original gravestone of Mary (Mollie) Sneden. It disintegrated many years ago. However, the Historical Committee of the Palisades Free Library had a 1903 photograph of the stone. As the picture did not clearly show the words of the inscription, the Committee searched old records. The exact words were finally found by Helene Stansbury in a Dutch Reformed Church hymnal.

For a decade it has been proposed that the Sneden gravestone be replaced. members of the Historical Committee have just erected a new stone at the head of Mollie's grave in the Palisades Cemetery. It is made of pink granite and should last for another two centuries.

The historical record is not entirely clear as to whether, during the Revolution, Mollie provided food and other necessities to the Patriots, the Tories, or to both. But before, during, and after the Revolution she was unquestionably this communi-ty's best known citizen. She died in 1810, but stories about her and her redoubtable career as the ferry woman continue to intrigue us. She lived at the foot of the hill for over a century, rowed the ferry across the river, had two daughters and seven sons, was suspected of Redcoat sympathies, and was, according to legend, able to bring down 100 passenger pigeons with one shot. She is but one of the many interesting men, women, and children buried in the Palisades Cemetery which is a valu-able heritage to be appreciated by this community.

After the nine o'clock ceremonies at the Flagpole on Memorial Day, May 31, there will be a gathering at Mollie's new tombstone. Members of the Historical Committee will also be glad to point out the grave of Captain Jonathan Lawrence, Jr., a Revolutionary soldier; those of the veterans of other wars; the oldest stone; that of Nicholas Gesner, whose diaries tell us about life here in the nineteenth century; and W.S. Gilman, Jr., who enthusiastically collected all kinds of information about Palisades and its families from the 17th century on, and gave it to the Library, where it can be read today.

His last book of poetry, "Another Look," came out in 1976. The cirtic R. W. Flint described Mr. Gregory as "a Depression poet, not a Villager of the first extraction, who wrote with muted eloquence in the highly civilized lilt of Manhattan-Hibernian Classic." Louis Untermeyer said that Mr. Gregory was under the spell of the Classicists until he saw the tenements of New York.

Mr. Gregory was born and grew up in Milwaukee. At one time he thought of becoming a painter, and studied at the Milwaukee School of Fine Arts for three years. "I decided to switch when I found myself writing poems on canvas," he later said. Mr. Gregory graduated from the University of Wisconsin in 1923, and began writing poetry and criticism for the New Masses, New Republic and The Nation.

In addition to eight books of poetry, including "Collected Poems" in 1965, Mr. Gregory was known for his translations of the poems of Catullus and Ovid.

As a biographer, he wrote "The World of James McNeill Whistler" and "Amy Lowell." He also edited "Selected Poems of Robert Browning" and "The Portable Sherwood Anderson."

He began teaching at Sarah Lawrence in 1934 and became professor emeritus in 1960. Horace and Marya Gregory are survived by a son, Patrick, of Northampton, Mass., a daughter, Joanna Zeigler of Edinburgh, Scotland, and five grandchildren.
