There are some new surprises for our former students and an enticing array of courses for those considering starting a new field of interest, polishing up a skill or talent or just relaxing with a rewarding change of pace after work or school. It's all here and more this year for adults, teens and children!

A highlight of the new and innovative visual arts courses offered this year, is a very special Artist's Interchange led by widely recognized contemporary artist Stephen Greene which will challenge emerging artists ready to show their work and will include visits to New York galleries, studios and lofts. In addition, the visual arts department will offer calligraphy, ceramics, etching, jewelry and cloisonne, painting and drawing, photography, sculpture, papermaking, stained glass and has added stone and wood carving, an advanced sculpture course and color photography. Etching students will be delighted with the new Charles Brand press.

New teachers on the visual arts staff this year include, Coco Shoenberg and Edna Nitopi, accomplished ceramists who will offer new insights into the potentials of pottery making, and Harry Peterson, a fine color photographer. Mauritz Rofhok, a native of Finland, will share his expertise as a sculptor in a life modeling class and a class featuring alternative sculpture techniques and materials as well as preparation for casting. Carol Bacon will lead a much requested course in stone and wood carving methods. They join fellow artists and instructors Janet Mayone, Roberta Leber, Roberto DeLamonica, Els Heber, Margery Myerson, George Morris, Jerre Vanderhoef, Jo Blanchet, Marjorie Kubach, Gertrude Simon, Liz Rose, Jim Klukkert, Fran Schultzberg and Gerda Quoohs.

Children and teens may participate in ceramics, painting and drawing, multi-media and photography classes geared to their particular age groups and conveniently offered after school and on Saturdays. This year Susan Roth, a young award winning artist recently graduated from Bard, will join this department.

A new Dramatic Arts department has been added this season which will revitalize and continue the traditions of the Center's founders, among them Maxwell Anderson, Helen Haves and Lotte Lenya. Renowned screen and stage actor, Mike Kellin will lead an acting workshop for adults which will include improvisation, exercises and scene studies as well as light performance presentations. Young people may choose from a Teen Acting Workshop, Theatre Games for Children and a workshop in Shakespeare for Young People. The faculty, chosen for their experience in the theatre arts include, Jean Brock, Raymond Roswell and and singer, actress and director Jeremy Broun.

The Dance and Movement Department has been reorganized this year and will offer classes grouped in three, 10-week sessions. Adults and teens will enjoy our new Dance Workout class and an Elementary Ballet class taught by Cheryl Pomerantz Bass, a newcomer to the staff and an accomplished dancer and choreographer. Also joining the staff this year is jazz teacher Barbara Gilbert, Veteran teacher. Helga Waldman will lead Modern Dance Exercise, Aerobics Plus and Jazz. Alexander Technique with Ann Sickles Mathews, Fencing with Allan Kwartler and Yoga with Pat Plotnik round out this departments' offerings for adults.

A full curriculum of dance training for children includes ballet, jazz, modern dance and pre-school movement. Carolyn Santoni-cola, formerly with the Ballet Russe de Montecarlo, will lead the ballet classes this year.

The Center's popular music courses are again offered under the direction of Stephen Covello. Adults and teens who are already competent instrumentalists may join the String Ensemble Workshop, the Mozart Sinfonia or the Philharmonia Players of Rockland. For children, the Center offers group piano instruction, group or individual violin lessons, folk guitar and adds a new Voice Workshop. Concert pianist and teacher Linda Oehlberg joins violinist Deborah Shovlin and guitar and voice teacher Sonja Savig on the music faculty this year.

The art of writing is taught in many forms in our Literary Department. Courses such as Creative Writing, Poetry, Reporting and Women Writing are offered by our teachers Henry H. Roth and Michael Rumaker, fine writers themselves. Staff additions this season include newswriter Morris Renek and author Barbara Wersba.

In addition to the many 10 and 12 week courses, the Center also offers intensive one-day workshops, and this year, beginning Oct. 16th, will continue the very popular photography workshops. A full program of calligraphy workshops is also announced, including one for teens, and will feature a special film "The Story of Writing" with a lecture by Yaroslava Mills.

Each September, the Center presents a Faculty Exhibition and Open House so that the public may meet teachers and view their work, visit the studios and view demonstrations. Open house this year will be on Sunday, Sept. 12, from 2 - 4 PM.

School registration has begun and will continue through Sept. 13th by mail and through Sept. 15th in person. Registration hours are daily 9:30 - 8 PM and weekends 1 - 4 PM. As an added service, the Center now accepts Visa or Mastercharge for payment. Center members and senior citizens receive discounts.

Classes for adults, teens and children are conveniently scheduled during the day, evening and on weekends. They are limited in size so early enrollment will not only ensure a place in class but will also

THORPE INTERMEDIA GALLERY

These long summer days are not days of rest for the director of Thorpe Intermedia Gallery. She and her staff are busy planning an exciting new season for your enjoyment. According to director Adele Myers, it promises to be one of the best seasons of exhibits and other events since the gallery's founding in 1976.

The schedule for 1982-83 will include such diverse elements as prints produced by painters, photographers, and sculptors; art objects that display a spirit of play, gaming, and humor; glass houses; carved wood; and the famous Bread and Puppet Thea-

ter.

Thorpe Intermedia's seventh year of service to the public opens on Sept. 26th with SYNERGY/ARTISTS 1+1=3. Sixteen artists will exhibit etchings and monoprints made during the past year at the Hudson River Edition workshop located in Garnerville, N.Y. Of the 16, two are skilled printmakers. The others are better known as painters, sculp-tors, or photographers. A sample of this type of work will hang next to their prints so the gallery goer will have the chance to compare and contrast.

This will be followed in November with an exhibit that shows the humorous and playful side of art. There will be participatory games and other activities as well as a wide variety of objects guaranteed to make viewers smile.

Thorpe Intermedia Gallery has a tradition of bringing artists and public together. In the spring, a wood carver will set up his studio on the lawn near the entrance to the gallery. Using logs from the nearby woods, he will carve out his sculpture as visitors watch.

Meanwhile, on the inside, will be an exhibit of works by several contemporary sculptors, proving that wood carving is not a lost art!

Other exhibits include one showing the

practical and experimental use of glass in architecture, and a show highlighting a number of contemporary artists who work in a variety of media.

And, for all those who've been begging Thorpe Intermedia to bring back the Bread and Puppet Theatre, they're scheduled for an outdoor performance on April 30, 1983 -stilts 20 feet tall, tin band, and all!

Thorpe Intermedia Gallery is nonprofit. It is located on Rte. 340 in Sparkill, New York, near Exit 5N of the Palisades Parkway. It boasts the largest space for art exhibits in Rockland County, and works under the aegis of the Intermedia Foundation of Garnerville, NY. Programs are funded by the New York State Council on the Arts and the Rockland County Legislature. gallery also is supported by donations received from both public and private sources.
