The Philharmonia Players of Rockland, the resident chamber symphony orchestra at the Rockland Center for the Arts, will begin its fourth season of free concerts on Nov. 11th, Sunday at 5 pm. at Suffern High School. #### Etching Studio Opening

The Heaton Gallery at Rockland Center for the Arts is being renovated as the site of the newly purchased, high precision Charles Brand etching press. In 1974, the world-renowned artist John E. Costigan donated a rare etching press to the Center, thus sparking the inception of the Center's Etching Department. The etching program has grown and flourished under the guidance and tutelage of Roberto de Lamonica, master printer and winner of eight international awards, including the Guggenhe'm Fellowship in Printmaking.

Many of the artists who have been involved with the studio over the years have donated their works to the Center to demonstrate their faith in and gratitude for the etching opportunities the Center provides. These works will be on exhibition in the Emerson Gallery and are being sold to ease the burden of the loan, which was taken to purchase the \$5,200 press. Among the artists who have donated their works are Roberto de Lamonica, Jim Tanaka, Yaroslava Mills, Dorthea Hope and Carolyn Delisser.

Works that have been produced at Hudson River Editions Etching Atelier will also be exhibited. The proceeds from the sale of this group of works will be shared with Hudson River Editions, founded in June, 1980 by Sylvia Roth, who worked at the Center, first as a monitor, then as a teacher during Roberto de Lamonica's leave of absence and, finally, as etcherin-residence. Works by Sylvia Roth, Anne Poor, Stephen Greene, Alan Young and Judy Deming are among the works in this group benefitting both institutions.

#### RESTAURANT REVIEWS

L'ARC DE PROVENCE, located on North Broadway in Nyack, opened in May of this year. It represents Pierre De La Dezeze's debut in the restaurant world although he learned his craft at home with his family in the southwest of France. Monsieur De La Dezeze calls his place a French country restaurant and pastry shop. The atmosphere is that of a comfortable French bistro. The attractive dining room seats 45 people, the cafe section in the front holds fifteen, and five people can sit at the bar.

The dinner menu offers a limited selection but is supplemented with specials every evening. We all opted for the same appetizer but, in the interest of this column, had to make other choices. We decided on the following: Shrimp with Pernod Sauce, fresh plump shrimp but with a shade too much Pernod, the Pate Maison, a good, hearty country pate, and the Escargot in a garlic butter sauce -- this was voted the best out of three. Prices start at \$2.95 to \$4.95.

For entrees, we again each wanted to order the same, the Halibut in Lobster Sauce, one of the evening's specials. One guest was given that privilege with the others getting a taste. It was quite good, the halibut poached to perfection, the lobster sauce delicate and smooth. ordered from the menu, La Truite Provençal, fresh trout stuffed with scallops and onions with a light sauce of its natural juices and cream. I enjoyed it but would have liked another tablespoon or so of the sauce. The third entrée was also a special, boneless, poached Breast of Chicken in Tarragon Sauce, one of my favorite We all agreed that it was good but also need a bit more sauce. Now this may sound as though we like our food to be drowning in sauces, but we really want (Cont. pg. 6)
