What is Orienteering? Orienteering is a sport which is growing rapidly in the U.S. and has been going on in Europe for over sixty years. Participants of all ages range from those who leisurely tour the course (recreational orienteers) to those who make a mad dash over the course to test their endurance and ingenuity (competitive orienteers). It is a sport which challenges both the mind and the body. The object of the sport is to use map and compass to locate each control marker at designated land features. The key to orienteering is more the ability to make wise decisions than the ability to run like a deer.

ROCKLAND CENTER FOR THE ARTS is now in its fourth decade. It began in 1946 when a group of Rockland artists and residents, Helen Hayes, Henry Varnum Poor, Kurt Weill, Lotte Lenya, Maxwell Anderson and Maurice Heaton prominent among them, formed "The Rockland Foundation". From its modest beginnings as a showcase for local artists the Center has evolved into a major arts organization, offering the county's most comprehensive program of classes, workshops and exhibitions. There is currently a strong movement underway at Rockland Center to expand the performing arts department, to establish a school of acting, dance and music of the highest quality and to bring innovative and competitive productions to the region. Recently an active committee composed of local actors, musicians, dancers and patrons joined to pursue these goals. And estimable advisory committee including Helen Hayes, Brenda Forbes, Ellen Burstyn, Arlene Dahl, Tatiana Trianos, Edmund Battersby, Marc Rosen, Richard Cassidy and others, all established artists with an interest and an investment in this community and a concern for the future of the arts in this country, has also been formed. The energy behind this enterprise is enormous and in order to raise money for this venture, a Benefit is planned at the "Treetops" Estate on Saturday the 17th of July (rain date

#### RESTAURANT REVIEW: ANGEL CAFE

Summer is here and thoughts turn to dining al fresco. What better place to go than the Angel Cafe, located at the foot of the Nyack Marina, where you can have a delicious dinner and enjoy the charm of the Hudson River. The Angel Cafe opened in 1980 and is run by the well-known Bully-boy Chop House in Congers. We loved eating there last summer and were pleased to find they have expanded the menu yet maintained the quality.

We began by sharing an assortment of the hot and cold appetizers (for the sake of this column). Each was delicious. I favored the Chicken Tonnato and the Smoked Salmon Mousse. My husband, Jack, had more than his share of Steamed Mussels in white wine, shallots and parsley, and reluctantly parted with half of the Hot Mushrooms stuffed with crabmeat. Prices range from \$2.50 to \$4.95.

I could not resist their evening special, Fried Soft-Shell Crabs. They were quite good although I prefer them without the breadcrumbs. Jack found the grilled Salmon with dill Hollandaise quite satisfactory. My favorite entree is the Tilefish with pecans and Dijon mustard sauce. You think you are eating a succulent lobster with a piquant sauce. I wish

I knew how the chef does the tilefish because I have failed to duplicate it at home and I have tried. I am also intrigued by the Seafood Puff (creamed shrimp, scallops, crabmeat, in, of course, a puff pastry shell) and the Veal Scallopine sauteed with artichokes, mushrooms and pimientos. A very nice green salad and fresh vegetable and potatoe are included in the price of the entrees which go from \$11.00 to \$14.50.

As for desserts, if you love chocolate (I do), try the French Silk Pie, a rich, thick, fudge concoction in a flaky, coconut pastry shell. I could not finish it but then it is not bad for breakfast either. They also serve a Cold Sabayon with fresh strawberries - sounds tempting. All desserts are priced at \$2.95.

From Memorial Day through the summer, dinner is served outside with a seating capacity of sixty. This year, the restaurant opened in March with dinner served inside in a small but charming room with candles and flowers on every table. The restaurant does close for part of the year but no date has been set yet.
