RESTAURANT REVIEWS: THERESA'S

Theresa Miraglia, a resident of Nyack, greatly encouraged by all those who had dined at her home, decided to start her own restaurant. So, after months of renovating the space formerly occupied by the Turning Point, THERESA'S opened in October.

The room has been attractively done in tones of brown with some very nice art work, including an Erte illustration. The spacious tables and Breuer chairs offer one a comfortable manner in which to dine. The restaurant only seats 32 people so reservations are requested. The menu is Italian with the choices limited since everything is made by Theresa. She does -- on occasion and at her whim -- prepare something extra that is not on the menu.

We began by asking for a sample from the Antipasti selections so we could all have a taste. The Stuffed Mushrooms won out over the Carpaccio, Cold Stuffed Jumbo Shrimp, and Fresh Roasted Peppers and Anchovies. The other choices were Mussels in White Vermouth and Herb Sauce and Fresh Vegetables with a Hot Olive Oil and Anchovy Dip. Prices range from \$3.50 to \$4.95.

For the first course, we were offered a choice of $\underline{\text{Minestrone}}$ or $\underline{\text{Pasta Alfredo}}$. We all opted for the pasta, and it was perfect.

On to the main course -- one guest ordered Sovrana De Pollo Fiorentina, a boneless breast of chicken stuffed with spinach, cheeses, prosciutto, and pine nuts. We all had a taste and pronounced it quite good with a nice texture. Jack ordered the Filetto Di Spigola Alla "Livornese", poached striped bass with clams, mussels, and shrimp. The fish was perfectly cooked, and the sauce delicious. However, we felt the mussels and clams were not quite up to par and should have been eliminated. Our other companion ordered the Vitello Allo Marsala, but the veal was tough. This is not the fault of the kitchen as it can happen. With much apology, he was offered a choice of another entree, but our friend was quite full by then and declined. The charge was therefore subtracted from our bill. I had the Rollatine Melezane, eggplant rolls stuffed with four cheeses (but don't ask me which ones) and I loved it.

Salad was served afterwards, and Theresa apologized for not being able to offer arugula. However, the red leaf lettuce was fine, and I could give a gold star to the place for not including iceberg lettuce in the salad. Entrees start at \$10.50 up to \$18.50 and include pasta or soup and salad.

For the two of us who had to have our chocolate fix, there was nothing on the menu. We settled for Theresa's special <u>Cassata</u> with diced candied fruits, nuts, and chocolate chips. She said she is considering offering a Sacher Torte, made locally, to satisfy those with similar cravings. I later returned and sampled it as well as her homemade <u>Cannoli</u>, and both were excellent.

A few words about the wine list. In keeping with the mood of the restaurant, only Italian wines are offered. We had a very nice Pojar E Sandro, Chardonnay di Faedo at \$14.50. It was dry, crisp, and quite pleasing. The other selections include Viticcio Chianti Classic at \$9.50 and Fabio Berlin Collio Pinot Grigio at \$13.50.

The atmosphere of the place is such that you get the feeling you are dining in a private salon and not a restaurant. The service is very leisurely and you should plan on from two to two and a half hours from start fo finish. We were very relaxed and enjoying good wine and conversation, but we thought our main course could have been served sooner than they were. This was partly our fault as we first had a discussion about the wines and then enjoyed a glass before ordering dinner. You can request that they speed things up a bit, but Theresa and staff want to maintain the relaxed and comfortable feeling of eating in a private dining room.

For those who are prone to Allergies, cold weather does not necessarily bring relief. The home itself contains many offensive allergens. The only answer is to allergy-proof

ones home, which is not an easy task.

We are printing the following check list for your information. It was taken from an article in the Journal News by Eleana Siegel and sent to us in the hope that the information will be of value to the allergy sufferers of our community.

ALLERGY-PROOFING -- A HOME CHECK LIST

Allergy-proofing a home begins by removing substances known to trigger allergies. Here are some suggestions:

- Use synthetic, dacron, or polyester pillows instead of pillows with foam, feather, or kapok stuffing, The pillow stuffing, even under a cover, can cause allergic people discomfort.

- Cover pillows, mattresses, box springs with plastic, zippered covers, and seal the zippers with masking tape. This is protection against the dust mite, a microscopic creature that lives inside these accessories and causes a great deal of allergic misery.

 Buy simple, basic furniture of smooth wood, plastic or metal instead of stuffed or upholstered furniture. It's more protection against the dust mite, which cannot be seen

but certainly can be felt.

- Use washable cotton or synthetic fabrics for curtains, sheets, blankets and rugs instead of fuzzy fabrics, quilted or chenille bedspreads, wool or shag rugs, venetian blinds, heavy drapes, sleeping bags or down comforters. Fiberglass curtains are fine.

- Don't store down parkas (which may be

filled with allergens) in frequently used rooms or closets.

- Keep dust collectors such as knicknacks, books, records, toys and stuffed animals outside the bedroom. Use boxes, closed shelves and plastic bags to store clothes, toys (washable toys are advised) and books. - Use wood or tile flooring, which will prevent dust buildup. Carpeting is a favorite home for the dust mite and vacuuming often makes things worse because it circulates the dust.

- Place the bed away from heating ducts and vents.

Avoid irritants such as moth balls, insect sprays, aerosol sprays and powders.
 Use a dehumidifier to help reduce mold

CATS CATS CATS

As many of you know, we have a "stray cat problem" here in Palisades. It was brought to my attention through neighbors calling to ask if any of them were mine. We have seven cats, all of which have been neutered at six months.

Being an animal lover, I feel very protective of these poor helpless and homeless creatures -- especially in anticipation of the winter months ahead. I also feel obligated as a member of the community to take on some of the responsibility to stop this

rapidly growing cat population.

The solution, I realize is not simple. After speaking with Mrs. Stone from The Elmsford Animal Shelter, in Elmsford, New York, who told me she was willing to help us in this matter, I feel maybe we can do something. According to Mrs. Stone, we should try to capture them using "Have a Heart" traps, which are safe and cannot do any harm. They can be obtained from the ASPCA or at "Farmer Jones" in South Spring Valley.

Myself, along with others in the area will be trying to organize a way to work together on this. Mrs. Stone has pledged her help in bringing the captured cats to the shelter for adoption, and has mentioned that kittens especially could probably be given homes. This shelter does not exterminate their animals. And I am sure they would welcome any donations at this time.

If you think you can help, please call me at 359-0141. I have labeled all our own cats with our name written on a white flea collar in order to distinguish them from the strays. I suggest this as a preventive -- we wouldn't want to have our neighbor's pets mistaken for strays and sent away!
