PALISADES FREE LIBRARY

THERE'S NOTHING OUT THERE

Horror Film Made in 10964 Territory

With the start of the new year comes the dawn of a new movie, and with the drop of the apple in Times Square comes the falling of an alien from outer space. This is how the movie, *There's Nothing Out There*, begins.

The movie was filmed right in 10964's own backyard at the residence of Virginia Dare and on the property of Joya Verde on Woods Road. Watching the movie is like taking a tour of the area; for example, we see the town of Piermont where a dream sequence was filmed. Another sequence was filmed at the house of John Kim, the film's properties assistant, who lives in Piermont. The film company also did on-location shooting at Tappan Zee schools and other neighborhood sites.

The movie is considered to be a comedy-horror by first time producer/director Rolfe Kanefsky, who has aspirations to be the next Spielberg. One would think he is already on the way to attaining his goal. Rolfe's father, Victor, was a major investor in his son's endeavor. Mr. Kanefsky works at Valkhn Films where the film will be edited. The rest of the money came from independent investors. The film, which was staffed by 38 crew members, one special effects man, and ten cast members, is expected to run about 90 minutes once final editing is completed. It is being slated as the first movie of the new year and is being distributed both to video stores and movie theaters. Casting for *There's Nothing Out There* took place earlier this year in New York City where 100 applicants auditioned. Out of this group, ten were selected.

Palisades was chosen as the ideal setting for the movie--close enough to New York City, yet woodsy enough for the desired effect of having seven kids chased by an alien who has "dropped in" from outer space. Filming took place from August 7 to September 9

of this year. And how was this experience for Palisades residents, Joya Verde and Virginia Dare, who lived through the production?

"It was quite an adventure," they agreed. "Our lives were upside-down for a month. Our days were backward, since most of the filming took place at night. The crew ate their breakfast at 6 p.m.," they said with some dismay. Both felt they had never seen such hard workers. "There was a high degree of professionalism among the crew, cast, and the young production assistants." Would they consider doing it again? "Only for our own projects which are in development," they said with knowing smiles.

Verde and Dare want to take this opportunity to thank all of their neighbors for the extraordinary good will displayed throughout the whole process, for enduring such things as heavy traffic, sound and lights at night, and "for having the annoyances but not the excitement we had. They were all great sports."

Producer/director Rolfe Kanefsky is currently majoring in screen writing at Hampshire College. His best friend, John Kim, is majoring in Physics in the University of Chicago. As a first venture, *There's Nothing Out There*, should prove to be a howling success. The movie's staff would like to thank everyone in this area who assisted them in their production.

TAPPAN ZEE ELEMENTARY SCHOOL - ONE YEAR OLD -

"It was a sunny day. A very, very, very sunny day," said Eric Prusinowski talking about his first day in kindergarten in the Tappan Zee Elementary School. As he spoke, the five year old drew a picture of that memorable day, adding one sun after another for a grand total of nine.

"The school car drove up," he said pointing to the lower left portion of his drawing. "I got into the car. That's me, the little face. The driver is the big face."

"What is school like, Eric?"

"There are lots of things to do. There are shells, books, a blocks section, paints. . ."

"What else?"

"Puppets. But they're still in the box. I like puppets."

"You've been in school only one week. You'll get to play with the puppets."

"I know."

"Are there any animals?"

"There's a...a...a hamster."

"And do you have any friends in your class?"

"Sarah and Chuckie and there's Caleb but he's in another class."

"What do you think of school, Eric?"

"I've only been there a few days."

Carolyn Spence has been principal of Tappan Zee Elementary School since reorganization one year ago. The opening this year was a snap compared with last year and its problems of staffing and supplying a new school. "What a difference a year makes," says Mrs. Spence.

It took exactly one year to get a traffic light installed on Route 9W at the entrance to the school--red tape, red tape and more red tape. The light operates only during dismissal time when micro processors inform the system that busses are exiting from the driveway.

The computer program continues to grow. The Computer Assisted Instruction program (CAI) for the first grade features sixteen computers in the library. Each kindergarten room has two computers and soon each first grade room will have one.

A new program was put in place this semester. Pat Dufy, a kindergarten teacher last year, moved up to the first grade with her class. The greatest benefit is that it gives teachers an opportunity to evaluate the kindergarten curriculum from the vantage point of the first grade. What works and what doesn't work? What should we be doing in kindergarten to better prepare children for the first grade? It is hoped that next year two classes will move up to first grade with their teachers. Parents may choose not to have their children participate.

With a kindergarten enrollment of 162 children, nineteen are from Palisades. Of the 187 first graders, eleven are Palisadians. The Tappan Zee High School last June graduated approximately five Palisadians. It very much looks as if Palisades has a bumper crop of youngsters.

"Tappan Zee Elementary School has two advantages," says Mrs. Spence, "an incredible staff of people and its children."

At TZES it's always a sunny day.

A NEW WAVE FOR HAWAII

"Is Dr. Raleigh in?"

"Which Dr. Raleigh?"

The confusion has been exported. On September 27, the Lamont community assembled in Hawaiian dress to roast the Drs. Diane and Barry Raleigh (psychologist and tectonophysicist) and send them off to the University of Hawaii. Barry Raleigh, Director of Lamont-Doherty Geological Observatory of Columbia University for the past eight years, will be in charge of a conglomerate of marine and earth science institutions. Diane will take up a position as a clinical psychologist. They may miss their spectacular river view from Torrey Cliff, the Lamont Director's official home on the campus atop the Palisades, but probably not: their new home looks out over Diamond Head and the Pacific Ocean.

Barry Raleigh came from the United States Geological Service, at Menlo Park, California, where he had been in charge of the earthquake prediction research program. Diane followed him from California, and they were married shortly after he took up his post at Lamont. During his tenure at Lamont the Observatory and its staff of 110 postdoctoral research scientists, 100 graduate students and several hundred technicians has strengthened its leading position among world-class earth science institutions.

The Raleighs have been an invigorating presence here; Hawaiian surfers are in for a bracing ride. We wish Diane and Barry the greatest success.

On September 8, Elmwood began its new season with The Foreigner by Larry Shue which will run through October 7. Its second production, Thieves, opens November 10 and will play through December 2.

Thieves, directed by Bobbi Schevitz, is a bittersweet charade of Manhattan high-rise life styles. Its author, Herb Gardner, who also wrote A Thousand Clowns, is known for his rueful sense of humor, for comedy laced with something a little strong and more meaningful. Leonard Probst, NBC, said about Thieves, ". . . (it) says more about New York and its people than any play in years. I loved it!"
