Committee for the Palisades School

Last year a special committee was appointed by the School Board to study school building utilization. Group members toured the various schools and, among other things, queried principals about the number of students that could be comfortably taught within that particular facility.

In 1976 Dr. Holland, principal of the Tappan Zee Elementary School, said: 432.

At a March 9, 1977 meeting, Dr. Holland said the building would hold 501.

Bridge, a publication mailed to taxpayers in the school district on March 25, 1977, stated the school administration's position that the building capacity is: 600.

The Committee for the Palisades School then called Mr. Dumond of the Educational Planning Facilities Board, State Department of Education, Albany, who stated the school could hold 432.

From 432 to 501, 600 and again 432? Buildings do not grow! The building has eighteen classrooms, plus a music room, art room, and the library. The presently accepted twenty-four students/teacher/room ratio indicates that the school can educate 432 children (18x24). This figure calls for the present learning disabilities room to become a classroom, with these children meeting in a corner.

The Committee for the Palisades School is presently carefully checking enrollment statistics to 1) ascertain if there is in fact appropriate space within the Tappan Zee Elementary for the projected enrollment, and 2) whether the projected enrollment figures are more accurate than the conflicting numbers above concerning school capacity.

The Committee for the Palisades School hopes other communities are checking their figures as well.

The Candidates

It is School Board election time again. The two candidates running against the incumbents are John Kriz and Sylvia Baumel. Our friend and neighbor John Kriz -with four children in the school system—has devoted himself to the cause of quality education in the South Orangetown Central School District. Sylvia Baumel of Orangeburg, active in the PTA Council and informed about state educational legislation, is known by Palisades people to be intelligent and dedicated to the needs of our children.
Vote. If your voice counts any-

where, it is in small, local elections. See PTA column for registration dates if you are not a registered voter.

This year's election is important to the residents of the school district due to the possible consolidation, as well as the power held in the hands of our School Board. For example, it is within their control to bus a Palisades kindergartener to a school located in Blauvelt. (The Board promises not to this year, but is not sure about 1978.) Our BOCES children (a special program for those with emotional and maturity problems and minimal brain dysfunction) could be bussed outside our district if the Board feels space is unavailable within our own schools.

It is essential to elect clearthinking, idealistic yet practical individuals to the two seats. Do your share; vote.

Palisades Historical Committee

Our publication The Story of the Ferry was a success; all copies were sold. We hope Palisades amateur historians enjoyed their copy. We continue to consider projects aimed at disseminating Palisades historiana and memorabilia to residents. We hope to announce our next activity in the May 10964.

Palisades PTA

The PTA board members attended meetings concerning the Tappan Zee Elementary School's functioning next year and no satisfactory answers to the following questions were forthcoming.

- 1) possibility of busing to other areas - effect of a new ruling which says that the Board of Education may place a child inany school in the district whether it is near his home or not
- 2) relocating BOCES elementary children into the middle school with older children
- 3) possible elimination of learning resources room
- 4) safety factors concerning small children traveling on 9W (state law allows them to stand)
- 5) actual numbers of children per classroom and per teacher. (There is indeed a 24 student/1 teacher ratio. In actuality however there can be, for example, 240 children in a school with ten teachers. This satisfies the ratio requirement. But one teacher can have 35 and another 15 due to a smaller

kindergarten class perhaps. In fact the legal ratio relates to an overall building set-up. That is, as long as that school containing the 240 students has ten teachers, the actual classroom size is at the discretion of the administrators. The PTA is concerned that the climate for learning will be destroyed as class sizes increase. The children lost daily 40-60 minutes learning time this fall; now are they going to lost space which will affect educational programs?)

We hope to report in the next newsletter that our questions have been answered.

Palisades residents may register to

vote in the School Board election on April 23, 9am to 1pm April 27, 4pm to 9pm April 29, 4pm to 9pm at the Tappan Elementary School, Washington Street in Tappan. If you are registered to vote in political elections, you are automatically registered to vote in a School Board election. Election Day is May 4th at the Tappan School. School Board members are elected for a three year
