Memories of The Way We Were

I loved my little two-room schoolhouse, now the Palisades Community Center, and I lived so close to it that I could leave home when the last bell started to ring and be there on time! Much to the chagrin of my schoolmates, I won prizes for perfect attendance and for never being late and they said, "But Mildred lives right on top of the school!" In retroat the time I was close to tears. My mother took me to school that morning and left before I was assigned a seat. We has what was called "assembly", marching around the room, singing, saluting the flag and then being seated. When assembly was over the teacher, an old man (by my standards), told me to sit up front until he found a seat for me. I sat where I was told, under some geranium plants that were on a shelf above me. They had recently been watered and the water poured down on me, but I did not complain nor move an inch. I was quite wet when I was finally given a seat. After a while we had recess and I, hoping school was over, ran home. My mother hugged me and sent me back to school in dry clothes.

A few feet in back of the school there was a huge pond, formed by a dammed up stream; we could put on our skates at school and walk out on the ice. My father was an accomplished figure skater and liked to draw a crowd around him while he did the Dutch roll and figure eights, backward and forward. The young boys built big bonfires around the edge of the pond but they did not warm me, and very soon I would stumble home and roll on the floor in pain as the blood started to circulate in my poor feet. Grandma insisted that I soak my stiff, frozen feet in COLD water and it certainly helped. Below the skating pond was an ice pond

and all the men in town came to cut the ice. Sometimes they worked on Sunday and then my father took me down to the pond to watch. I am a little vague about just what happened, but I believe I remember horses going out on the ice pulling some sort of cutter that carved squares in the ice. Then

the men sawed through these squares in some fashion (how did they keep from being submerged?), pushed the cakes of ice up on to a moving trestle where they entered the ice-house and were packed in sawdust.


I was not allowed to do many of the exciting things I would have enjoyed, such as "walking out" on Sunday afternoon in summer or sledding down hill in winter. And oh how thrilling that was! Throwing yourself "belly whoppers" on your sled and flying down the hill in the dark, dragging your feet so you wouldn't plunge into the river. I was glad that, thanks to my indul-gent mother, I did have several furtive trips.

Sometimes the Hudson River froze over and horses and sleighs could drive accross to the other side, since there were no boats keeping the channel open as they do now.

In those long ago days the seasons seemed to be sharply defined-spring, the mud season; summer, swimming and picnics; fall, Halloween and burning leaves (I can still still ranoween and burning leaves (I can sin sin smell 'em), and winter, snow and Christmas. I think I loved winter best with the snow squeaking under our boots and the beauti-ful Jack Frost designs on the windows. We played fox and geese in the snow at recess in the open field across from the school, and made group more that latted for wooks

in the open field across from the school, and made snow men that lasted for weeks. There are so many memories "in the corners of my mind" and over the years you have heard most of them. Recently, some-one I love said, "What a slender thread is the present moment upon which we balance our lives. A fraction of a second, a twinkling of an evel and the present has become the past an eye, and the present has become the past. I'm glad I grew up in those long ago days. As I look back it seems like another world, but a precious one.
