
# Palisades Presbyterian Church

It has been more than a century since the stormy night when Charles F. Park and Winthrop Gilman climbed the roof of the barely completed Palisades Presbyterian Church to ring in the New Year of 1864. That bell has continued to ring, week in and week out, through war and peace, as a reminder to pause and reflect on the many changes that have occurred through the years.

The history of the Palisades church is an exciting chapter in a story of self-determination and commitment to purpose. Without the dedication and hard work of many of our predecessors, this little church would long since have closed its doors.

It was in the spring of 1863 that plans were formulated for the organization of a church in the hamlet of Palisades. The steamboats that used to navigate the Hudson River were gradually being replaced by the Northern Railroad of New Jersey. The day-long sojourn to New York City was shortened to an hour and 15 minutes, making it possible for those who worked in the city to now think of Palisades as more than just a "summer home."

On April 23, 1863 several prominent residents met at the home of Mr. Charles Park for the purpose of "discussing the propriety of erecting a Presbyterian place of worship at Pali-sades in Rockland County, N.Y.". On June 1, 1863, 115 years ago this month, ed. It was officially organized on October 26th of that year when the first pastor, Joseph Greeleaf was ordained and installed. The sanctuary was subsequently dedicated on January 17, 1864.



Besides the choir room added in 1882 very few changes took place in the Palisades church during the years that followed. In fact, Elder Gilman, at the special historical service of the church's 25th anniversary, noted in his Tappan Zee Thrift Shop "Restrospect" that with few exceptions, most of the original interior of the church was the same as it was when first occupied in 1864.

drive was begun and in time a modest instrument was purchased and dedicated to his memory.

The Parish House was completed for the centennial year and soon after the original though refurbished organ was also replaced.

As the years have passed, many pleasant memories linger for the residents of Palisades -- the cottage prayer meetings held during the winter months, the Ladies Aid projects, the gathering of ground pine to fashion into massive ropes for decorating the church at Christmas, and the church fairs with barrels of lemonade and delicious ice cream sliced and wrapped in paper to delight the children. Memories are still in the making as the community joins the congregation for the Christmas eve service and people gather each Memorial Day for the annual pancake breakfast.

Although the Palisades Presbyterian Church remains relatively untouched by time and represents an important historical landmark, it also serves  $\alpha 11$  the residents of Palisades in a variety of ways and is a viable asset to the entire community. BARBARA HOVSEPIAN

# Lamont

Lynn Sykes of Palisades has been elected a member of the National Academy of Sciences. For an American scientist it is one of the greatest honors. Sykes the foundation of the church was start- is especially known for his research on predictions of earthquakes.

Bill Ryan, formerly of Palisades and now living in Nyack, and Martine Rawson of Englewood, in collaboration with among others, Floyd McCoy, Ann Stern, Janet and Goesta Wollin of Palisades have produced a map for the U.N. Law of the Sea Conference which shows the global distribution of mineral wealth on the floor of the oceans. It is the most up-to-date compilation of its kind and it has already whetted the appetite of international greed at the conference in Geneva.

In the first week of May Lamont hosted a three day visit of about a dozen oceanographers from the Peoples Republic of China. An invitation has been issued to Manik Talwani, Director of Lamont, to tour

the laboratories in China in the fall. Goesta Wollin, Bill Ryan, and David Ericson of Nyack recently published a study in which for the first time climatic changes, magnetic intensity fluctuations, and variations of the eccentricity of the earth's orbit were correlated. The correlations went from the present back to 800,000 years ago. The study has important implications for understanding the causation of climatic changes GOESTĂ WOLLIN

#### West Hudson Environmental Assoc.

Those of you who have reveled in the beautiful change of lowered decibels and safer driving along 9W and 340 are alerted that relief may be only temporary. The Department of Transportation is considering a modification of the Truck Ban which would exempt all of East Rockland County, from the N.J. State line to Stony Point, from the 10 ton limit. If this is allowed to happen, the legal number of oversized trucks using 9W could escalate to 400 to 500 a day. This would make it much easier for illegal trucks to use the road, and enforcement of the ban almost impossible. Back to "Gasoline Alley"!

Palisades residents who worked to establish this ban have agreed to support a modification of the ban which would allow in and out delivery throughout Orangetown, but draw the line there. If you agree that we cannot return to the hazardous hassle of heavy hauling through our hamlet it is URGENT to write Commissioner William Hennessey, New York State Dept. of Transportation 1220 Washington Ave., State Campus, Albany, N.Y. 12256, and Senator Linda Winikow, 138 North Main St., New City 10956
