The service will include Home Box Office, some additional sports channels and some so-called distant signals from Boston, Buffalo and Wooster, MA, and one or two other cities. The system will have a 35 channel capability although not all of them will be used in the beginning.

Cable TV

A cable Television franchise has been granted in Orangetown which may finally bring good television reception to Palisades in the next year or so. Good Vue, which presently serves West Nyack and Spring Valley, must, by the franchise terms, complete building the majority of the Orangetown system within a year from now. Good Vue has not decided on the order in which specific neighborhoods will be wired but Palisades will not be last, even though the area is on the outskirts of Orangetown. One of the influential factors is that the company is also applying for a franchise in Norwood, NJ and should therefore build south and east of the center of the town.

The rate for Good Vue's basic cable service - signal enhancement, distant signals and some sports events - will be \$8 per month. The additional charge for HBO is not yet determined.

Community Health Notes

In response to calls about emergencies and what to do until help arrives, we offer the following:

Fracture and dislocation - legs, neck, back; keep flat, splint injured part, clean cloth on wound, keep patient warm, no food or drink.

Poisoning - Drink 2-3 glasses of milk or water, check label for directions, syrup Ipecac - but NOT with oil, gasoline or corrosives.

Shock - Cover, keep calm, lie down with feet raised, no fluids.

Bruises - Cold cloths to area

Burns - Cool water to area, keep clean.

Dog Bite - Let wound bleed, clean with soap and water, get information re dog's immunizations

Fever - Increase fluids if alert, cover lightly, cool water sponges to forehead & joints

Frostbite - Don't rub! Thaw slowly with tepid water, wool covers and warm drink

Earache - Apply cold or heat as desired

Fainting - Lie down with head lowered, loosen clothing, cold cloths, smelling salts

Fitting Memorial

Ruth S. Salmon, who lived in Snedens Landing from 1927 to 1960, died on Oct. 5th at her home on River Road.

Mrs. Salmon helped to move and preserve the Palisades Library when it was transferred from "The Big House" and she was active in its operation for many years. Her husband has suggested that any donations in her memory might be made to the Palisades Free Library.

West Hudson Environmental Assoc.

Even though it is a year and a half since the 10 ton weight limit was placed on trucks using Routes 9W and 340, the Bergen County industries using our roads in preference to New Jersey roads are still trying to destroy this vital truck restriction.

Their local politicians are now working through an advisory committee appointed by the Tri State Regional Planning Commission. The committee which "coincidentally" is headed by New Jersey's Transportation Commissioner, recently submitted its report to the Tri State Commission which will meet and consider it on Nov. 8. The report includes various recommendations ranging from drastic weakening of the ban to outright elimination of it.

This totally biased report, which is strictly advisory, does not contain suggestions for using New Jersey's roads to serve New Jersey's industry. Clearly, the burden of a connecting link between 9W in New Jersey and Rte. 303 in New York rests on New Jersey's shoulders. New Jersey encourages industrial growth and its tax rates but has been relying on New York's road systems to handle the ensuing traffic for years. Rockleigh Industrial Park's use of 340 and Oak Tree Road is a prime example.

To counteract this deplorable situation the West Hudson Environmental Assoc. organized a letter writing campaign to Gov. Carey and New York State Transportation Commissioner Hennessy urging them to preserve the ban and not bow to the political pressures coming from New Jersey.

The big battle was won when the ban was established in 1978. We are confident of winning this latest skirmish.
