West Hudson Environmental Assoc.

The accident involving a Mack truck and car at the intersection of 340 and Oak Tree Rd. on the morning of Sept. 8th is a good example of why heavy trucks do not belong on our residential roads. The driver of the trailer truck was going down Oak Tree hill when his brakes failed. The light was red at the intersection and knowing he couldn't stop, he frantically blew his horn hoping to clear the intersection. One car didn't get out of the way in time and was hit in the side rear. It ended up under the truck, which hit and splintered a utility pole. Miraculously, both drivers escaped with minor injuries. The area was without power for an hour and we were lucky that time.

A special truck safety inspection conducted by the N.Y. Dept. of Transportation and State Police in the Albany area last month showed as many as 1/3 of the trucks operating in N.Y. State may be so dangerously unsafe that they should be immediately taken off the roads. The inspections took place August 9th along Interstate 90. A total of 22 random trucks were escorted to a testing area. The startling results were just published in the Sept. issue of N.Y. Motorist, the official publication of the Automobile club of N.Y. They showed:

--Seven trucks were found to have safety defects so severe that they were taken out of service on the spot.

--Nine other trucks were told to repair safety deficiencies within 15 days.

Here's more: A government study recently conducted by the National Highway Traffic Administration analyzing accident

statistics for 1976 found: --Accidents involving heavy trucks accounted for 1 out of every 11 persons killed on the highways.

--Fatalities in heavy truck accidents in 1976 increased 15.7% over 1975.
--Three-fourths of these accidents began

with a collision with another vehicle.

--In 55% of the cases in which one vehicle struck another, the truck struck the

--When a passenger car was involved in an accident with a truck, car occupants accounted for 97% of the deaths.

All of this confirms the importance of the heavy truck ban on our residential roads.
