Wood Stoves

Wood burning stoves are sensible alternatives to escalating heating oil costs, they are interesting to look at and they are a good place to warm your mittens and socks. Several Palisades residents have already discovered the advantages of burning wood and, in fact, some can often be seen scurrying around collecting that replenishable fuel.

Awareness of the crisis status our search for energy has reached has made people look closely at methods widely used previously but neglected in the bustle of progress. After almost a century of using other sources, we are beginning to reconsider burning wood on a large scale. In 1977, over half a million wood stoves were made in this country, and more were imported. Wood stove stores are starting to appear. A new one has just opened in Sparkill, called County Wood Stoves - 359-5116, owned by Carol and Bill Shirghio who got into the business when they decided to buy a stove for their own home.

There are several things to consider when deciding how best to heat your nome with a wood stove. First, figure out how many cubic feet you will want to heat by multiplying width by length by height to arrive at the size stove you'll need. The model you choose should depend on how well insulated your area is and what sort of weather it is exposed to. For most efficient operation, the stove you choose should heat neither too large nor too small an area. In other words, it should not over work or under work.

The most efficient stoves are air tight and made of properly sealed cast iron. They should have an adjustable draft to control the rate of burning. Obviously, the stove should radiate heat evenly and not lose it up the chimney. An efficient stove will produce heat for long periods with minimum amounts of wood by not only breaking the wood down into gases which burn when mixed with oxygen, but also by introducing enough oxygen through the regulated draft system to combust the unburned gases by pushing them over the source of the heat rather than up the chimney. When you are shopping for stoves, you should ask how much wood they take in a load and how often they should be restoked. This will allow you to compare efficiency among brands and types.

Not all the gases do burn, of course, and the residue is

creosote that collects on the stove walls and in the stovepipe. It must be cleaned out about twice a year since it is flammable material. A quick look at the classified sections of several local newspapers yields a selection of chimney sweeps.

There are very specific requirements for installation of a wood burning stove and not to observe them would be foolhardy. Stoves must be a certain distance from combustibles which must be protected by masonry or heat shields. Connector pipes should be insulated double wall pipes and fastened and sealed properly to eliminate the possibility of leaking creosote. The stove can be fitted into existing fireplace and chimney openings (have the chimney checked first), or a chimney can be built to accommodate it. Again, it has to meet specific standards for height and distance on the roof.

The Shirghio's will consult and install as well as sell the actual units. They carry six different brands of stoves and can order others. Carol Shirghio gave us the following cost rundown for an average purchase and installation:

Stove	\$450
Chimney Pipe	200
Installation	100
Fire Boards	80

(Fire boards replace masonry.) She says using the stove will generally mean recovery of these costs in less than a year. The objective, and it is a reasonable expectation that you will meet it, is to keep that thermostat off all winter and heat only with wood. There are several good books on this subject, including *The Woodburners Encyclopedia* by Jay Shelton, available at the Shirghio's, and *The Wood Stove and Fireplace Book* by Steve Sherman at the Library. Besides the current fuel efficient capabilities of wood burning stoves, using them means making a commitment to the future. It's a very positive and direct way to do something

Palisades Triangle

At long last we are pleased to announce that we have our woodland park. The closing took place on August 1, the Town of Orangetown took title to the "Palisades Triangle" for preservation in its natural state.

Twenty-five percent of the \$50,000 purchase price came from private donations. Most of that came from Palisades residents and some from non-Palisadians who supported the concept of preserving the Triangle. The other seventy-five percent came from the State of NY, Division of Housing and Community Renewal.

The total of the donations was \$17,139. After paying all expenses (legal, title insurance, survey, mailing, etc.) we had a little more than \$2,000 left which has been refunded to the donors on a pro-rata basis.

As previously announced, we are asking the Town for individual receipts for the various donors for tax deduction purposes and we hope to send these out in the very near future. We have sent each donor an accounting of all expenses incurred.

Establishing this.park has been a long and sometimes frustrating process but thanks to the determination of Palisades residents to keep the rural character of their community, we have met with success -- a demonstration of community action at its most effective. Our fears of having an unsightly commercial development in the center of our hamlet have been allayed for all time.
